Donna Yvonne Blondeau, passed away on Tuesday, September 15th, 2026, in Saskatoon, Saskatchewan, at the age of 70 years, leaving behind a life marked by generosity, kindness, courage, and a steadfast spirit that touched everyone who knew her.

Born on August 17th, 1956, in Moose Jaw, Saskatchewan, Donna carried the strength of her prairie roots throughout her life. She was a woman of deep conviction and quiet grace, someone who believed in the power of compassion, the dignity of every person, and the importance of living with purpose. Her life reflected a spiritual understanding that love is not only spoken, but lived through action, service, and the way one shows up for others in times of need.

Donna pursued her education at the University of Regina, where she majored in psychology and minored in geology. Her studies reflected both her desire to understand the human heart and her

appreciation for the world around her. She brought thoughtfulness and insight to all she did, and those who knew her often saw in her a rare light with the ability to listen deeply, speak truthfully, and encourage others with wisdom and warmth. She also had many certificates through the HeartMath Institute as well as many others, including as a certified courthouse dog program leader. Her education helped shape a career devoted to helping people, and she became the first Victim's Services Coordinator of the Moose Jaw Police Service. In that role, she offered comfort, guidance, and stability to individuals during some of the most difficult moments of their lives. Her work was a true extension of her character, and she served with dignity, empathy, and unwavering dedication for over two decades. Donna assisted MJPS in acquiring Kane, from the Pacific Assistance Dogs Society, where together they worked as a canine assisted intervention team, the first in Saskatchewan. She was also a long-standing committee member on the Moose Jaw Trauma Response Team, as well as a co-ordinator of the Moose Jaw Police Services' Critical Incident Response Debrief Team.

Donna's commitment to service and community was recognized through the Queen's Diamond Jubilee Award, a meaningful acknowledgment of the difference she made in the lives of others. Along with many other certificates and recognition awards, some of which include the Chief of Police Innovation Award, recognition from the John Howard Society, and MJPS Corporal's and Inspectors Compliment. Yet for Donna, recognition was never the goal. She was motivated by a sincere desire to ease suffering, uplift others, and leave the world better than she found it. She understood that even small acts of care can carry great power, and she lived that truth faithfully.

Her spirituality was a guiding light throughout her life. Donna lived with an open heart and a deep trust in the presence of the divine. She was the kind of person who encouraged others not to give up, to keep moving forward, and to remember that every challenge can be met with courage and grace. She had the rare gift of making people feel seen, valued, and strengthened. Her words and her example inspired many, and her life served as a reminder that faith is often expressed through kindness, perseverance, and love in action.

Donna found joy in the beauty of the outdoors, and she especially enjoyed kayaking and canoeing. She appreciated the peace of water, the movement of fresh air, and the sense of freedom that came with being outside in nature. She also had a deep love for the arts, including guitar and drawing, which allowed her to express her creativity and her gentle spirit. She cherished time spent hosting large family gatherings, where laughter, conversation, and togetherness filled the room. These moments reflected what mattered most to her, which was connection, belonging, and the simple joy of being surrounded by those she loved.

She was predeceased by her parents, Gladys Blondeau (née: Gardipie) and Arthur Blondeau; grandparents, George and Bella (née: Boyer) Gardipie, Joseph and Mary-Alexandrine (née: Klyne) Blondeau; nephew, Arek Hawkes; brother, Ronnie Blondeau; partner, Valerie Girard; and her dogs, Kane and Sophie, and cat Cody. Their memory remained with her, and the bonds of love they shared continued to shape her heart. Donna is survived by her sister, Sandra (Ralph) Hawkes; nieces and nephews: Joey (Dean) Streelasky, Jay (Nick) Oleynick, Jacquelyn Hawkes, and Marc (Desiree) Hawkes; and the remainder of the Blondeau family. Her family was a source of joy and meaning in her life, and she treasured each relationship with tenderness and devotion.

Those who loved Donna will remember her as a generous, kind, and courageous woman whose presence brought comfort and strength. She lived with a sincere and giving spirit, and she faced life with resilience and faith. Her legacy is found not only in the work she did and the lives she touched, but also in the example she set by living with purpose, compassion, and spiritual grace. She reminded others that a meaningful life is built one loving act at a time, and that the light we carry can continue to shine in the hearts of those we leave behind.

Donna's life was a blessing, and her memory will remain a source of encouragement to all who were fortunate enough to know her. May her journey be held in peace and may her loved ones find comfort in the enduring love, wisdom, and strength she shared so freely.
