He continued until his semi-retirement to the town of Rouleau. He was proud of the fact that in 2008, Hamdorf Family Farm received the award for some of his land that was farmed by family for 100 years. Dick was a quite and unassuming man. He enjoyed a spring day, watching the flowers and trees blooming in his yard, and the seed going into the ground. He appreciated a good day of harvesting and felt he was blessed with a good life. For the past six years he was a resident of Pioneer Lodge in Moose-Jaw and the family would like to thank all the staff for their gentleness, patience and kindness that was shown to Uncle Dick.
